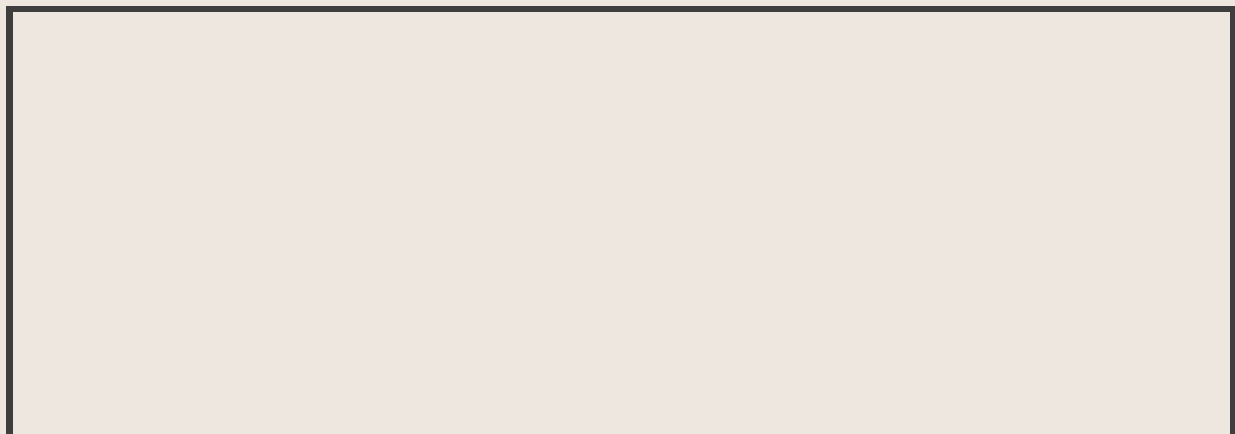

What classes do you teach and are there any after school programs or activities you're involved with?

I teach Freshman Biology, Anatomy & Physiology, Psychology 1 & 2, and AP

Psychology. I am involved with liturgical choir, the drama program, and enjoy attending/helping at various athletic events.

What drew you to want to be a teacher at Saint Rays?

I came to Saint Rays because I was assigned to come here through the PACT program at PC, but I have stayed beyond my PACT time because I love this school. I chose PACT over a West Coast program because of the welcoming and homey feel I got from Saints, which made the cross-country move more appealing (I am from Wisconsin).



What is it like being a teacher at Saints?

Being a teacher at Saints really is being part of the Saints family. Learning to be a teacher at a tight-knit school like this has allowed me to form meaningful relationships with both students and colleagues that I truly enjoy, and I have learned so much during my time here. I love being part of this stage of high-school students' lives when they are forming their identities and making big life decisions.

What message do you have for your students?

What is it like being an alumni and a teacher to future alumni?

Legacy Faculty Spotlight

Linda Michalczyk

When did you start teaching at Saint Rays?

I began teaching at Saint Rays in 1979. I was hired by Br. Dan Casey to teach English and Science. In the fall of 1984, I left to investigate

other career options, but returned in 1990 after realizing that teaching was my passion and Saints was the place I felt I belonged.

What jobs have you held at Saints?

Over the years, I've had my hand in many things. I was the first female varsity coach—coaching the girls softball team in 1984. I've been a class moderator for at least six classes and the Student Counsel Moderator for a couple of years. I've been the English Department Chair and taught Physical Science, Biology, and Chemistry at different times in the Science department.



I've played in the liturgical group and was in charge of the music for liturgies for a few years. Marie Dufresne and I organized and refereed intramural volleyball in the eighties. After so many years, there are many opportunities to contribute to school activities.

Can you share one of your favorite Saints stories?

I'm not sure one story can illustrate what is "favorite" to me about Saints. I will say that, to my knowledge, students here have been open and accepting of each other. This is not a utopia, I know, but I have taught in other schools, and I do feel students here have allowed each other to grow and have accepted each other in ways I haven't seen in other schools.

What has being a Saints educator meant to you?

I have lived my adult career at Saints. To a great extent, I am who I am because of my experiences at Saints. I have learned to be a better teacher, a better mentor, and a better person from my association with the students in my classes and working with wonderful people. I look back on my growth and the changes in my style of teaching over the years and wish I could go back and apologize to some students. Because of those students, I have learned patience and understanding. My life is associated with Saints, with generations of students. I have been blessed to teach here. My sincere hope is that my former students think of me with warmth and care that I remember them.

What is your current role at Saint Raphael Academy?

I have been the International Student Coordinator for the last 10 years. Our international program began to increase in 2012 when we decided to actively recruit international students interested in studying the United States. Initially, most of our students were from China, but at this time we have hosted students from 8 different countries. Some of our students live in host homes provided by agencies we partner with, while others live with Saints' families. We even have some students living in a boarding community and attending classes with us. We now have 30 international students actively

involved in the academic and extracurricular life at Saints.

This program gives students of all participating countries the opportunity to learn about each other's cultures and cultivate life-long friendships.

I'm always willing to talk about the program and the hosting opportunities available to our student families and alumni families.

Student Spotlight **Natalya Cabral '23**

What is your favorite class here at Saints and why?

Here at Saints, my favorite class is my virtual AP United States Government & Politics course. I love being able to learn about something I have a lot of interest in, which is government. I have been able to learn about the foundations of our government as well as civil liberties and the key values our government is based on. Taking a virtual high school learning course has been very helpful in teaching me how to learn independently and manage my time, which will be beneficial as I go on to college next year.



What activities are you involved in here at Saints?

At Saints, I have been involved in student government for four years and I have been elected as the Class President each year. This includes planning events and working to generate funds for my grade.

I have also been part of the Yearbook Club for four years and I am a section editor for the Portraits Section there. I am also a section editor for the Saints' Sentinel, which is the school's newspaper.

I am currently a co-chair for the SRA Cultures Club, where we work to promote cultural awareness through projects, announcements, and what we hope to be our first cultural event this spring. Currently, we are working on the Pulsera Project fundraiser, in which 70 percent of the proceeds go right back to the Central American artists who designed the bracelets.

During my sophomore year, I helped found the Saints for Social Justice Club. We work to promote awareness of the many different social issues in our world through projects. Currently, in conjunction with my Moore Scholars projects, we are creating containers to hold free menstrual products for the school campus to target menstrual poverty and menstrual stigma in our community.

Over the course of four years, I have also worked as an Admissions Ambassador, helping out at open houses and virtual events throughout the years.

For athletics, I am on the Varsity Game Day and Competition Cheer teams. We have won our Game Day championship for five years in a row and we recently won the State Championship for this past competition season.

What are your plans for next year?

Next year, I plan to attend a four-year university and major in global business and economics. I hope to attend a university in either Boston or New York.

Please tell us about your experience speaking at NEASC.

This year, I was able to be on a panel of student representatives from all over New England for the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. In the spring, we participated in a webinar on the importance of "Student Agency." This was a great experience, and we were able to speak to hundreds around the world. From teachers, to administration, to even other student leaders, we were able to provide awareness on the importance of student agency and the advocacy of the student voice.

This fall, we were called upon to speak at a conference. Our session of the conference was called, "Engaging Students in Change," and we spoke to administration about various topics including highlighting student voices in their education, the politicization of our education, and the importance of building faculty to student relationships. It was a moment I will always be proud of because I feel like I was able to make an impact on many educators from around New England.

We also attended the keynote speech and heard from Boston College professor Dr. Belle Lian and Timothy Klein on the importance of transitioning from "burning out" to "burning bright." Though it was targeted towards educators, it was extremely insightful and highlighted issues that affect teachers, administration, and students.

Student Spotlight

What is your favorite class here at Saints and why?

My favorite class here at Saints must be AP Human Geography. I took this course in my sophomore year – 2020-2021 – with Mr. Kirejczyk. The course itself is unique, as it encompasses many different fields of study. Human Geography is not just about maps or borders; instead, it was a study of how individuals both affect and are affected by their environment, culture, economy, and every aspect of society. This understanding of the world as a very interconnected ecosystem of human societies' actions and reactions is incredibly unique and uncommon in any other

class. I also had a great teacher and great classmates who really stimulated discourse as well, since everyone else there was as interested in the subject as I was. Overall, AP Human Geography was an excellent class that has stuck with me over the years.

What activities are you involved in here at Saints?

I am involved in multiple activities here at Saints. I have been involved in the performing arts for several years, shifting which performances I participated in from year to year. This year I was in the musical *Mary Poppins Jr.* here at Saints, and I will soon be performing as captain of the SRA Dance Company this January. I am the editor-in-chief of the Saints' *Sentinel* and a member of the SRA Cultures Club. In the past, I have also participated in the Archery Club, the Tabletop Club, and Student Government as class treasurer.



What are your plans for next year?

My plans next year surround the start of my college education. I have not committed to any school yet, but Harvard recently accepted me. Wherever I may go, I intend to study International Relations. Most importantly, I hope to continue to try new extracurriculars at whatever school I attend. Some of the schools I am considering attending have competitive ballroom dancing teams, which seems like the next logical step in my experience as a dancer.

We heard you were just accepted into Harvard! How did your Saints education prepare you for applying to Harvard?

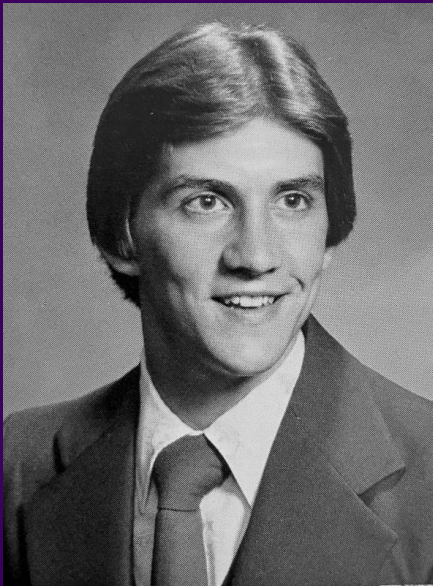

These values that are instilled in students like me make it possible for this student body to develop the self-discipline and integrity needed to be a well-rounded person, which certainly helped in my application process. Furthermore, Saint Raphael Academy sees the potential in every student, whatever that potential may be, and then encourages it by providing all the services necessary to achieve it. This occurs in every part of student life, in athletics, arts, and academics. I have had the pleasure of attending a school where I have teachers who are always available to answer questions, opportunities for advanced classes in AP, EEP, and virtual courses, and having a student body behind me who celebrates my success as well as the successes of all other students. This success is not measured in numbers, rather is the achievement of the goals that students can set for themselves and achieve with the help of their mentors and peers. When did you attend Saint Rays?

What did you do when you left Saints?

When did you attend Saint Raphael Academy?

I attended Saints from 1998-2002.

What did you do when you left Saints?

After Saints, I went to Rhode Island College and received a Bachelor of Arts in Studio Art with a double concentration in Photography & Graphic Design. I then went to Rhode Island School of Design to further study graphic design and typography. After college I worked for JW Graham/ Yes! Gallery in Wickford, RI as their graphic designer creating advertisements for Rhode Island Monthly and other local publications, re-designed their branding, email blasts and product photography for the store merchandise including Alex & Ani, Pandora & Byers' Choice Dolls.

In 2012, I took a position with Boston Warehouse Trading Corporation in Norwood, MA where I was part of the product development team designing product catalogs for buyers, logo creation for new product lines, art for products, presentation and sell sheets, packaging design for ABC's of Decor, and product photography.

*In October 2013, I left my position as a graphic designer to open my own photography business specializing in wedding photography, family portraiture, senior portraits, and personal branding for small businesses and women entrepreneurs. I am currently still running my photography business, **Mel Colvin Studios**. I have been published in Rhode Island Monthly's Engaged Magazine, Huffington Post, Newport Wedding Magazine, and Boston Voyager, and I am a 2022 Discover Rhode Island Best of Award winner, 2022 Best of*

What does a Saints education mean to you?

As an example, walking into Mrs. Estes religion class freshmen year to the scent of a Macintosh Yankee Candle was a feeling of home and comfort. Art class was where I excelled. Walking into Mrs. Larned's art room was a breath of fresh air and an area where I was able to let my creativity flow. She was the reason I went off to study art after high school. Lasallian Youth taught me the importance of volunteering my time and being kind to others. How the small gesture of a smile or a helping hand can brighten someone's day. Drama Club with Mr. Murray was truly a feeling of family and home away from home. Theater is where I found my tribe, working hands on with the crew. Twenty years later, I still consider so many of my Saints drama friends, teachers and now colleagues, family. Also, the college-like campus at Saints gave us a sense of freedom. Getting to walk in between classes and take in some fresh air was always beneficial! When did you attend Saints?

From 1968-1972.

Can you share one of your favorite stories about your time here at Saints?

Back then, Saints was all male. Every year at Christmas, a female choral group from a school in Providence (cannot recall which one) would come and perform for us in the gym. They were excellent, but more importantly, they were female and viewed as "goddesses" by all of us. Each year, a handful of seniors were chosen to act as escorts to/from Saints. Terry Tracey and I were picked and the two of us were on cloud nine for at least a couple of days.

Do you have any friends from your time at Saints who you're still in contact with?

Yes. Terry Tracey and I have remained friends and get together even now at least annually. We were in each other's wedding parties. I've also stayed in touch with some former

teachers, two of whom (Tom Power and Don Faulkner) attended our 50th reunion. Don also attended Holy Cross, so I would often see him at football games there as we were both season ticket holders.

How did your Saints education prepare you for life after Saints?

It provided two critical things—a good college preparatory education which enabled me to get into an excellent college (Holy Cross, following the two previous QBs at Saints) and it helped set my moral compass. Doing the right thing isn't always easy—in fact, it's often far more difficult than caving to pressure and going along to get along. Saints taught me how to stand firm and maintain my principles. That served me well throughout my career.

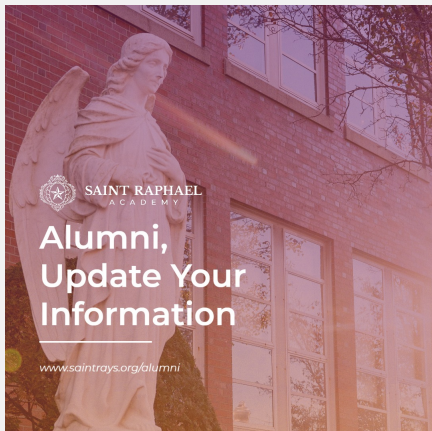

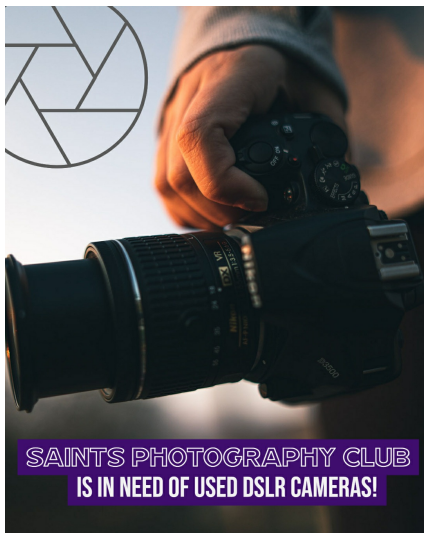

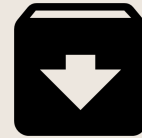
