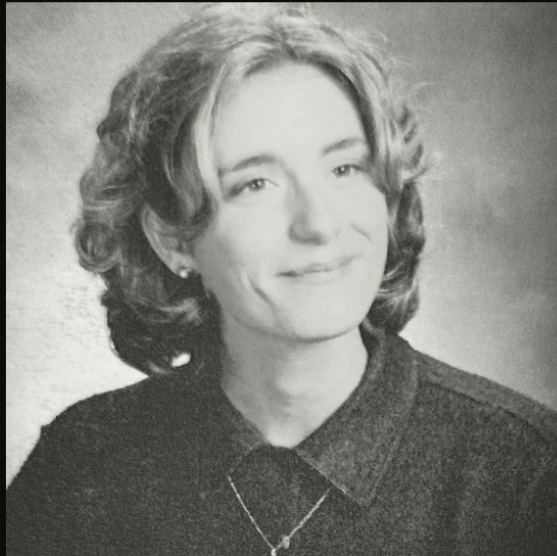
Calling all female alumnae!

Faculty Spotlight



Judy Baxter | Vice Principal of Academics

How long have you been at Saints? What was your background before coming here?

I have been at Saints for 12 years! I honestly never thought when I answered my phone in my car moving back from Florida that I would finally find the position I had wanted for so long or that I would be here 12 years later. Previously, I had "retired" twice. In my "other lives" I taught social studies and English at Coventry High school and for my last 8 years there was the English Curriculum Chair. I also took a "leave of absence" from CHS to become the Curriculum Director for Warwick Public schools for 2 years but returned to CHS because the educational climate in Warwick at that time was not conducive to change. When I retired from CHS we moved to Florida, I taught at Holy Trinity Episcopal Academy in Melbourne for 5 years and also served as head of the English department. This experience made me realize the value of a private education and the sincere focus on teaching and learning.



What is your favorite thing about working at Saints?

Honestly, there are so many things I love about working at Saints such as my colleagues, the mission, and the students. But my favorite is the fact that the faculty embraces educational change as needed and are eager to do what is best for our student body. They are always receptive to exploring new learning strategies with me and working with the Administration as a team to improve the quality of education for our students.

What advice would you share with current students?

My advice would be to always try to be the best version of themselves whether it's in the classroom, on the playing field or with their peers. It's okay not to be an A student or score the most goals or run the fastest or have hundreds of followers but if you have done your personal best then you can be proud of who you are and what you have accomplished. Becky Nelson | Teacher, English Department

How long have you been at Saints and what was your background before coming here?

This is my ninth year as an English teacher here at Saint Rays. It was always my dream to be a high school English teacher. Upon graduating from Providence College with a B.A. in English, I attended Brown University and earned my MFA. I taught writing at Brown for three years as an adjunct professor, an experience I will treasure. Somewhere along the line, I became intrigued with some of these high achieving student's stories. As I asked them what inspired them, they always said the same thing, support from family, the benefit of opportunity, and some incredible teachers. I felt that familiar tug. I wanted to be one of those teachers

that inspired someone younger to achieve their dreams through education. At this point, I went through the Teacher Certification Program at P.C. and taught at Mt. Hope High School for two years as a long-term substitute. A position became available here at Saints, I interviewed and was offered the job, and I have never looked back.

What classes do you teach?

I teach just about every 11th grader. I teach AP Language and Composition, English 11 Honors and English 11 ACP. There is not one class or level that I love more than another. I am fascinated with the science of reading and writing and I am challenged constantly by the ways different students learn, so much so that I am currently pursuing an additional master's degree in Literacy. I can honestly say that there is not a day that I do not look forward to going to work and I am never bored. What more could you ask for?

What is your favorite thing about working at Saints?

There are so many reasons I love working at Saints. I derive constant inspiration from my colleagues schoolwide and in my department. I have rarely seen such commitment to high standards and professionalism mixed with empathy and compassion in education. That being said, the students are the true reason for my passion for this job. The students at Saints come from hard working families who sacrifice a great deal to send their students here. The students are very much aware of this, and it is reflected in their work ethic, authentic nature and character. I love that the student body is diverse in all the ways that matter, and that they treat faculty, staff and each other with respect and kindness. Saints is able to balance academic rigor with Christian values to fulfill the mission of a Catholic, College Preparatory school in a way that I have not experienced elsewhere.

What advice would you share with current students?

I would tell them to get involved and participate in the clubs and activities. Go to the dances and the movie nights. At the end of your high school career, you want to look back at your time spent here as productive and educational but also as fun and memorable.

Tell us a little about what you've been up to since graduating?

Since graduating from SRA, I've pursued my Bachelor of Arts in Political Science at Boston College. Over the past nearly four years, I've added two minors—one in Journalism and another from the business school, titled Managing for Social Impact and the Public Good. I've continued to follow the passions I discovered in high school, joining Mock Trial, writing for the student-led newspaper, and serving as Editor-in-Chief of the Bellarmine Law Society Review, all while being the President of the Bellarmine Law Society.

Outside of academics and meetings, service has been a core part of my college experience. I've mentored first-year students through the Emerging Leader Program and spent spring break building homes with Habitat for Humanity as part of our Appalachian Volunteers Program. Needless to say, I've kept busy! Just as I planned four years ago, I've been accepted to law school. While I haven't made a final decision yet, I'm excited to become the first person in my family to attend law school and to fulfill a goal I've set for myself during my time at SRA.

How did your time at Saints prepare you for college?

SRA prepared me for college well beyond what I could have imagined. I remember in my freshman year of college, many of my new friends struggled with studying, time management, and staying on top of assignments. Reflecting on my time at Saint Ray's, I realized how well the teachers and administration equipped me to handle the demands of college coursework. I was accustomed to long hours of homework, balancing extracurricular activities, and maintaining a social life—so the transition to college felt much less stressful than I anticipated. In fact, my time at SRA helped me recognize my own capabilities, giving me the confidence to succeed in the classroom and beyond.

What is one of your fondest memory of your time at Saints?

It's hard to choose just one, but one of my favorite memories at SRA is definitely the Walkathon. Dressing up in school colors, hanging out with friends, and working towards a common goal while enjoying the whole school's company was always such a fun experience. My friends and I looked forward to it every year, and now I look back on it with great fondness.

Which teacher left the greatest impression on you?

I feel incredibly fortunate to have had such amazing teachers at SRA. There are so many who had a profound impact on me—Mr. McNamara, Mr. Kirejczyk, Mr. Sassi, Mrs. Nelson, Sra. Murphy, and of course, the legendary Mr. Murray—each one went above and beyond to support their students. But Mrs. Gaffney-Hsu will always hold a special place in my heart. I'll never forget starting our class with the Serenity Prayer and ending my day with a Saints' Sentinel meeting in her welcoming

classroom. As a first-generation student navigating the college application process, Mrs. Gaffney-Hsu provided immense support, whether it was editing my personal statement for the umpteenth time or offering words of encouragement. She reassured me that I would end up where I was meant to be – and she was right! She knew just how to challenge us and instill the confidence needed to succeed. I truly believe I wouldn't be at Boston College today without her and the many other incredible teachers at SRA.

Can you share a little about what you did when you left Saints and what you're doing today?

Since graduating from SRA, I've gone on to attend Brown University, where I am a second-year student. I am studying Education, focusing on the History and Politics of Education, as well as International & Public Affairs, with a concentration in Policy and Governance.

I've become involved with my school community through several activities including becoming the captain of the Brown Cheerleading team, working on the university's yearbook, and serving on the executive board for Club Sports at the school. I have also recently become the Chair of Youth Engagement for BrownVotes, a student-led nonpartisan initiative focusing on increasing democratic participation at Brown and in the broader state. This fall, my committee was able to go to Saints and present to the senior class how they can become more civically involved!

I have also had many opportunities to get involved with the local Rhode Island communities since graduating from SRA. Through the Brown Tutoring Corps, I have become a Site Leader for an After-School Mentoring/Tutoring Program at William D'Abate Elementary School in Olneyville. I have also served as a College Mentor for seniors at Charette Charter H.S. in Providence. More recently, I started an internship with the State of Rhode Island Congress, serving as a Legislative Intern for the Rhode Island Black, Latino, Indigenous, Asian-American, and Pacific-Islander Caucus, where I have been able to help work towards meaningful change for our communities of color in Rhode Island!

How did Saints prepare you for college?

My time at Saints provided me with both academic support and opportunities that have allowed me to thrive at an institution like Brown. The college preparatory environment was both rigorous and supportive, which helped me develop strong critical thinking and time management skills, while also providing me with the resources necessary to succeed. The balance between both high expectations and a strong support system from Saints helped me build resilience and confidence in my academic abilities. I also feel what helped me a lot in preparing for college was the mix of collaborative and independent learning in both small and large-sized classes which helped me learn to work effectively with others while also developing the discipline needed for independent learning. SRA also prepared me for a life of service and being engaged in the communities that I am part of, showing me the importance of getting involved and making a meaningful impact. The foundation of involvement and service that I built at SRA has shaped my commitment to staying engaged in the communities, both at Brown and beyond.

What is one of your fondest memories of your time at Saints?

Can you share a little about what you did when you left Saints and what you're doing today?

After Saints, I went to RIC for 2 years and then transferred to RIT in Rochester, NY where I earned a BFA in scientific/medical illustration in 1985. I created artwork for a professor at Brown University for many years while also working part time at a small illustration studio in Providence. I left medical illustration behind when I was offered an illustration position at Hasbro. I illustrated toy packaging for many years and worked on dozens of vintage toy lines. I then moved to Westchester, NY to illustrate for a company, which is where I discovered gift and passion for home décor design, which is what I do now. I have been freelancing out of my home studio in Lincoln, RI since 2004, and my main clients are Lenox and Homegoods/TJMaxx. I was always open to trying new things, so my career has taken many unexpected turns as far as the type of artwork I created. This has led to me having a wide artistic range (everything from medical illustrations to animals and people portraits), and I am grateful for that.



Was there a teacher who inspired you during your time here?

I transferred from Notre Dame High School in Central Falls to Saints at the start of my junior year and then graduated in 1979. I fondly remember Mr. Duluk and his biology/anatomy class. I liked his teaching style and will never forget the day he mentioned that scientific illustration was an actual career for anyone that draws well and loves science. That comment stayed with me for years and eventually became the path I would follow in college.

Do you have a piece of advice for the current students at Saints?

My advice to students would be to listen to their hearts, follow their dreams, and believe in themselves. Failures and challenges will come your way, more for some than others, but rising above those obstacles and moving forward is true success. My mother was ill throughout most of my time in college, and she passed away just a year before I graduated. Her death was a profound personal challenge that I had to face during those formative years, but I think in the end it made me a stronger more compassionate person.

What positions did you hold during those years?

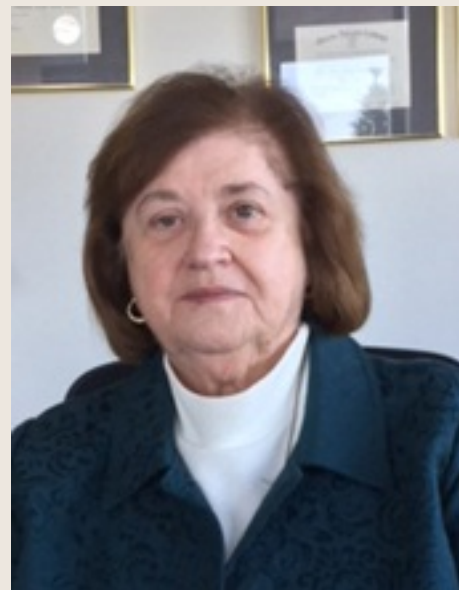

What did you do when you left Saints?

When I left Saints, I went to Boston College. I majored in Political Science and had a concentration in French. (During my junior year, I went for a semester abroad to France, which was a wonderful experience.) After BC, I went to law school in Washington DC at the Catholic University of America. Following law school, I chose to enter the world of government service. My career has been challenging and fulfilling. Part of my job is to protect individuals' privacy, and I consider that extremely important, especially today. In spite of the reputation that federal careers often have, the US government is filled with smart, caring, and hard-working individuals who go above and beyond to do their jobs well.



Do you remain in contact with any of your classmates?

I remain in touch mainly with one of my close friends/classmates at Saints and am in touch with a few others as well, including one of my former teachers. After graduation, I stayed in touch with more of my friends, but as the years went by, contact faded, unfortunately. It's easier to stay in touch now, with the presence of social media, and I would love to go to a reunion this year, having been unable to make the last couple.

How has your Saints education and the lessons learned shaped your life?

Among other things, my Saints education helped me to be aware of others in this life. I remember participating in activities like the 'Christian Action Program,' which was so eye-opening at the time. By and large, the teachers that I had at Saints took a genuine interest in us as students and as human beings - they were essentially role models on how to treat others. While Saints did not expressly teach this, I think it built upon something my mother also instilled in us - knowing what is important in life - not material possessions, but your value as a person and how you treat others. (My mother also valued education and worked hard so that I could attend Saints, which is why my husband and I created a scholarship in her name.)

Why is Saints still important in your life and why you have chosen to continue to support the school and our students?

Saints is still important to me because as I look back on my life, Saints provided me a strong foundation on which to build other experiences. I felt supported and encouraged, and based on my observations, I think most of my classmates did too. To me, Saints was special because it didn't matter if you were a "normal" kid or a super star of some sort - the teachers saw you and recognized potential, and tried to get you to tap it, however subtly. Of course, I realized this later as I thought about my high school experience - as a teenager trying to get to school on time every day, I wasn't really focusing on what it all meant to me. I also have always appreciated the community that I felt at Saints - my classmates accepted each other - you could be in different

friend groups or classes, but people didn't judge, so there was generally a sense of acceptance. I choose to continue to support Saints because the school continues to focus on students' personal growth and self-acceptance just as it did all those years ago when I was there. I also feel that the kids are the direct beneficiaries of whatever I can contribute.

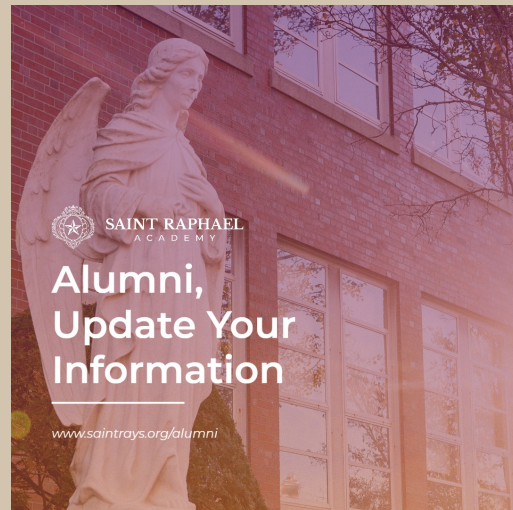
